For Women Leaders in Jewish Communal Organizations

Thank you for your interest in the third cohort of the Voices for Good Fellowship. This two-year fellowship creates a space for women leaders in Jewish communal organizations to build collegial relationships, explore Jewish values in leadership, and address challenges unique to women in Jewish professional life. Fellows learn together in monthly seminars with core and guest faculty through the duration of the experience. Goals for the fellowship include:



AMPLIFY women's voices by creating platforms that enable them to speak up and out on issues that matter to them.

STRENGTHEN the Jewish community's talent pipeline by building the skills of our future leaders and the network of our current ones.

INSPIRE self-reflection as well as individual and collective action to advance gender equity through Jewish wisdom and learning.

FOSTER networking relationships and opportunities between participants.

Basic Details

Aimed at: Leaders who identify as female, working for Jewish communal organizations in the San Francisco Bay Area, the Pacific Northwest, and the Denver-Boulder area.

Begins: February 2024.

Duration: Two-year fellowship.

Format: Monthly seminars held either online (synchronous) or in-person, following our in-person launch retreat.

Voices for Good develops and supports capable and visionary leadership for our community.



Jewish LearningWorks launched Voices for Good in 2018 as a multi-pronged initiative designed to advance gender equity in Jewish life, and support women in leadership in our community. Since then we have supported 160 professionals through the fellowship, communal gatherings, and 1:1 leadership coaching. The fellowship is core to Jewish LearningWorks' strategic initiatives to support the talent pipeline and advance diversity, equity, inclusion and belonging in the field of Jewish education.

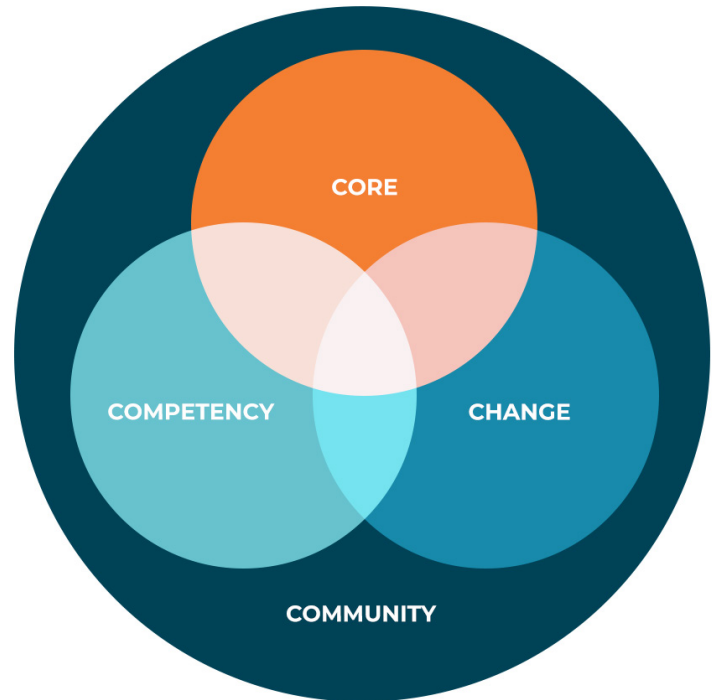

Eligibility Requirements

We are committed to offering an affinity space for women and women identified professionals working in Jewish communal organizations through this fellowship. We seek to create a cohort that represents a variety of Jewish communal organizations and the diverse identities held by members of our community.

Successful applicants will:

- View themselves as a woman leader in a Jewish communal organization.
- Understand their role as directly or indirectly related to advancing a vision for Jewish education and engagement for their organization's constituency.
- Be interested in exploring how gender and gender dynamics influence both their individual work and the Jewish community at large.
- Express vision and interest to invest in their career path as a Jewish communal professional.
- Desire to be part of a peer support network.
- Be employed full time by a Jewish organization(s) in the San Francisco Bay Area, Pacific Northwest, or in the Denver-Boulder area.
- Have worked in the Jewish community for a minimum of 5 years, anticipate service to the community for beyond completion of the fellowship, and do not anticipate retirement from Jewish communal work within the next 10 years.

Participation Requirements

Jewish LearningWorks strongly encourages employers to enable fellows to participate in fellowship activities as part of standard work hours. Participants must be able to:

- **Travel to the Bay Area** for a launch seminar in February 2024. Participant organizations are expected to arrange and pay for travel to and from Foster City, CA for the launch retreat on February 7-8, 2024. A travel stipend of up to \$500.00 will be offered to participants traveling from outside the Bay Area for the launch retreat.
- **Meet for monthly seminars** held both online and in regional pods during the work week through the conclusion of the fellowship in February 2026 (no monthly meetings held in July, or during holidays).

To deepen their own learning and strengthen the group, participants are expected to prioritize participation in all sessions.

Dates for August 2024-February 2026 will be determined in partnership with participants; the fellowship will not meet in July 2024 or July 2025.



Check your calendar for your availability before submitting an application to the program. We will accept applications from August 15 until November 13, 2023.

Participation Fee

The Voices for Good Fellowship fee is \$2,000.00 per participant, paid by the participant's employer. We require at least 50% to be paid before June 15, 2024.

Application Process

The third cohort of the Voices for Good Fellowship will comprise up to 18 participants, chosen based on written applications, and interviews with final candidates.

- **Applications:** Written applications will be accepted until noon on Friday, November 3, 2023.
- **Review and interviews:** Applications will be reviewed and interviews for final candidates will be held from November 6 to December 7, 2023. Details about how to schedule an interview will be shared after reviewing your application, if appropriate.
- **Notifications:** We will notify you about the status of your application by noon on Monday December 11, 2023.
- **Confirmations:** Candidates must confirm acceptance by noon on Wednesday December 13, 2023.
