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Last fall Jewish LearningWorks marked 125 years of training and supporting Jewish educators. Our work has taken many forms through the years — but what has remained constant is our belief that any child's experience is only as good as the Jewish role models they encounter at school, at camp, in teen programs, and in other Jewish spaces and places. Whether times are easy or hard, whether our community is unified or divided, Jewish LearningWorks looks for the helpers, as Mr. Rogers once famously suggested, and empowers them to tend to the rest of us. 

Increasing teacher learning increases student learning. Last year we:

- Hosted 33 professional development workshops, engaging just under 1,000 participants (39% increase). We strengthened the toolbox of educators with sessions on responding to the war in Israel, supporting teens, reaching neurodivergent learners, engaging multi-ethnic families, and more.
- **Provided 219 hours of coaching to 29 professionals.** "The support of coaching has been a critical part of my professional fulfillment. Deepened our inclusion programming to embrace the whole community

Last year we partnered with educational consultants, Alison Sorscher and Amy Freedman to help educators:

- Learn the language of inclusion to advocate for all children, and understand Individualized Education Plans (IEPs)
- Model social thinking for preschoolers to foster social and emotional awareness, and support the development of critical social competencies

We also provided:

- 24 grants to help schools purchase sensory tools to increase student focus, and support diverse learning needs.
- 14 customized inclusion trainings for family engagement professionals, educators working with preschoolers, congregational schools, day schools and teen programs.

Additionally, we partnered with Ariela Ronay-Jinich of Olamim on a two part series, Intersections. This workshop **introduced 23 educators to methodologies and best practices that address the needs of our multi-ethnic Jewish community,** expanding their understanding of the intersectional nature of diversity.





Selected the 3rd Cohort of Voices for Good Fellowship

Jewish LearningWorks proudly launched its third cohort of the Voices for Good Fellowship in 2024. **This two-year leadership development program for women leaders in Jewish communal organizations** creates an affinity space for participants to build collegial relationships and explore Jewish values in leadership. The fellowship advances our strategic commitment to enhance equity in the Jewish community and has supported more than 150 women leaders in Jewish communal organizations since 2017.

The dynamic Voices for Good Fellowship supports leaders to respond to pressing topics in their professional lives and creates immediate and lasting impact on participants, their organizations and the Jewish community. Cohort 3 is the first to include participants from the Pacific Northwest and Mountain states and is cultivating relationships between these distinctive, yet aligned, Western regions.

Voices for Good fellows and alumni serve as leaders and change makers in Jewish life. They approach our community and organizations with a loving and critical lens, identify what is working well and build on it. And, they also look at what could be improved and work within existing newly created systems to affect change. Our fellows represent the diversity of the Jewish communal experience and the Jewish future.

The year since the October 7
Hamas attack has been very
difficult for Jewish educators
and engagement professionals.
The need to create space for
divergent viewpoints among
parents, colleagues and students
while staying grounded,
and responding to rising
antisemitism has left many
feeling depleted.

In this context, we also experience record-high rates of depression, loneliness and anxiety in teens and young adults at home.


We desperately need what a shared community offers, yet building community requires the commitment and skilled presence of teachers, youth directors, camp counselors and mental health professionals.

Last year we provided high-touch, personalized support to educators, leaders and administrators:

- In **October**, we curated educational resources with an inclusive and learner-centered approach to Israel education.
- In **November**, we hosted a series with Israeli-American educator, Dasee Berkowitz, that offered communication strategies for staying grounded during hard conversations about the war.
- In **December**, our team:
 - Followed the series with drop-in sessions to help educators navigate their own response to the war.
 - Partnered with BaMidbar Therapy on a workshop exploring the protective factors, and risk factors, in the context of Jewish values to expand our understanding of teen mental health and wellness.
- Between **January** and **March**, we spoke or met individually with 140 communal professionals.
- Also in **March**, we partnered with Dr. Betsy Stone to consider how youth professionals can help adolescents focus on strengths rather than deficits during challenging times.



felt rudderless."

Jewish LearningWorks also continued to advocate for increased philanthropic support to local communal organizations since October 7, as many struggle to fill open staff positions — especially in preschool and day schools.





- BaMidbar's Mental, Emotional, Social Health Training for Experiential Educators: With this in-depth training, we offered 9 communal educators new and helpful language to understand the difference between mental health and wellness, languishing versus flourishing, and empowered them to proactively impact youth in Jewish education programs.
- Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA): In 2023–2024 we trained another 16 individuals who joined the 338 others we have certified over the past four years.
- **Building for Strength with Dr. Betsy Stone:** This training offered 12 educators a strengths-based approach to supporting Jewish adolescents in a time of so much pain and division within the community.

We also celebrated the **4th presentation of the Ruby Award, honoring Adam Lowy from Congregation Beth Sholom.** At this gathering we learned with Yehuda Webster from Kirva, who offered us a belonging and well-being framework to keep our communities safe, whole, and holy in the face of rising antisemitism, racism and islamophobia.


















In this inaugural year of supporting the Jewish Early Childhood Education (ECE) community, Jewish LearningWorks was able to create meaningful touchpoints for many educators across the region.

- The East Bay was one of five pioneering communities of ElevatEd, a national initiative to train 12 emerging educators and their mentors, and to recruit newish educators to the field.
- We gathered 230 educators from 18 different preschools for a day of learning on a variety of topics including documentation, teaching Jewish holidays, and strengthening teams.
- We convened 20 early childhood educational leaders on a monthly basis to connect, network, and brainstorm with their colleagues.
- We hosted a Directors' Retreat that provided time and space for leaders to assess their vision for their school and identify a specific area of focus for their work.

Finally, through our mentoring program we offered customized support for associate early childhood directors. These up and coming leaders were able to define the scope of this professional support, and receive concrete skills and tools to use in their work.




