Transforming Jewish Education to Meet the Moment

100% online Like the rest of the world, the Professional Learning team at Jewish LearningWorks learned a whole new way to practice its craft in the first six months of the pandemic. While building off a small existing distance learning program, we were challenged to create an expansive set of virtual learning opportunities

for educators that would hold onto the human-centered approach to education that we highly value.

In a typical year, our event calendar is quiet for eight weeks. However, in the summer of 2020, we offered weekly sessions to 252 educators which included "A Relational Approach to Distance Learning," "Distance Learning for Emergent Readers," a community of practice for congregational education directors, and two different weekly drop-in series.

As we moved into the school year we became more confident and comfortable with our skills as facilitators in digital spaces.

Our methods may have changed, but the core of our work was strengthened. We helped educators find their own growth edge and explore the context of Jewish values within a framework of a pandemic and social and political upheaval. Above all, we created spaces for people to ask questions and seek answers together with their colleagues.



The Jewish Community Library

The Jewish Community Library, a program of Jewish LearningWorks, serves as a unique ground for discovery, where both Jews and non-Jews can explore the Jewish tradition, history, and culture from many angles.

The Library offers a physical collection of nearly 40,000 items, as well as a robust eBook collection, book group support, and more than

60 virtual public programs

annually.

Over the course of the pandemic, our eBook circulation grew exponentially.

As our book talks and other public programs moved online, we expanded our reach, drawing growing numbers of participants from the Bay Area and beyond.

These programs have been particularly important to seniors, reducing their isolation during their many months of sheltering at home.






2020–2021 Financials

It's a great privilege to work alongside my colleagues at Jewish LearningWorks. They are not only my co-workers, but my teachers. I came to treasure this all the more during this strange time we're living through.

For more than a year during the pandemic, our entire staff met for a half hour every Tuesday morning via Zoom. Half of the time was devoted to work, with the other half allotted to a rotation of team members sharing a kavanah or teaching.

The work portions of our meetings were enormously valuable, particularly given our need to think creatively in response to the pandemic. But what I valued most were the teachings, which ranged from songs to reflections on personal heirlooms to examinations of biblical portrayals in art. It was a reminder that wisdom can be shared in many ways and even in a 15-minute time slot. Jewish learning has always been about both learning from text and learning from people, and I'm grateful that my job has regularly afforded me the opportunity to do both.

Welcoming Liora Brosbe

The Jewish LearningWorks team was delighted to welcome our newest Senior Educator, Liora Brosbe, last summer. Liora's portfolio includes family engagement, special needs inclusion, and social, emotional, and spiritual learning (SESL.) JLW's commitment to special needs inclusion stretches back decades. Our belief that every child should be enthusiastically welcomed in any Jewish educational setting underpins Liora's work. Her role is focused on providing sensory toolkits, creating training on best practices to respond to learning challenges, and offering customized observations and consultations.

Last year she also expanded our SESL work — introducing the educator community to the principles of trauma informed teaching, and identifying the importance of creating truly equitable learning environments.

Liora brings a rich background as a Licensed Marriage & Family Therapist and Registered Drama Therapist, a storyteller, and as the East Bay's PJ Library liaison and family engagement concierge. Liora is not the first Brosbe to work at Jewish LearningWorks. Her mother, Ellen Brosbe retired in 2015 after nearly 20 years working with the organization, serving the community as a dedicated force in nurturing and supporting Jewish educators. Following My Jewish Curiosity

Reading has always helped me to understand and refine my sense of myself as a Jew, and it continues to do so. But not until I found the Jewish Community Library did I have a place I could count on to have the Jewish books I want and need. Over the years, I've found that Library staff and programs have regularly provided me insights and ideas about the books they offer, encouraging me to follow my Jewish curiosity wherever it may lead me.

A few years after I found the Library, I asked if I could help as a volunteer, and next March will mark 30 years that I've volunteered at the Library. From my seat behind the circulation desk I've seen people who are touched by every aspect of our Library, including those served by our Book Club in a Box program, those who take out books about Jewish history, who read our selection of Jewish literature, or who borrow texts in and about Yiddish and Hebrew. They reflect the many ways that the Bay Area enables and encourages people to be Jewish, and I feel we help make Jewish ideas and heritage accessible to all of them.

During the pandemic, the Library has been able to provide exactly what people have needed while sheltering in place, and now beginning to venture out. I invite you to come in person, explore the eBook collection or attend a virtual event at the Jewish Community Library. You will be drawn, just like me, to this preeminent cultural treasure in the Bay Area.
